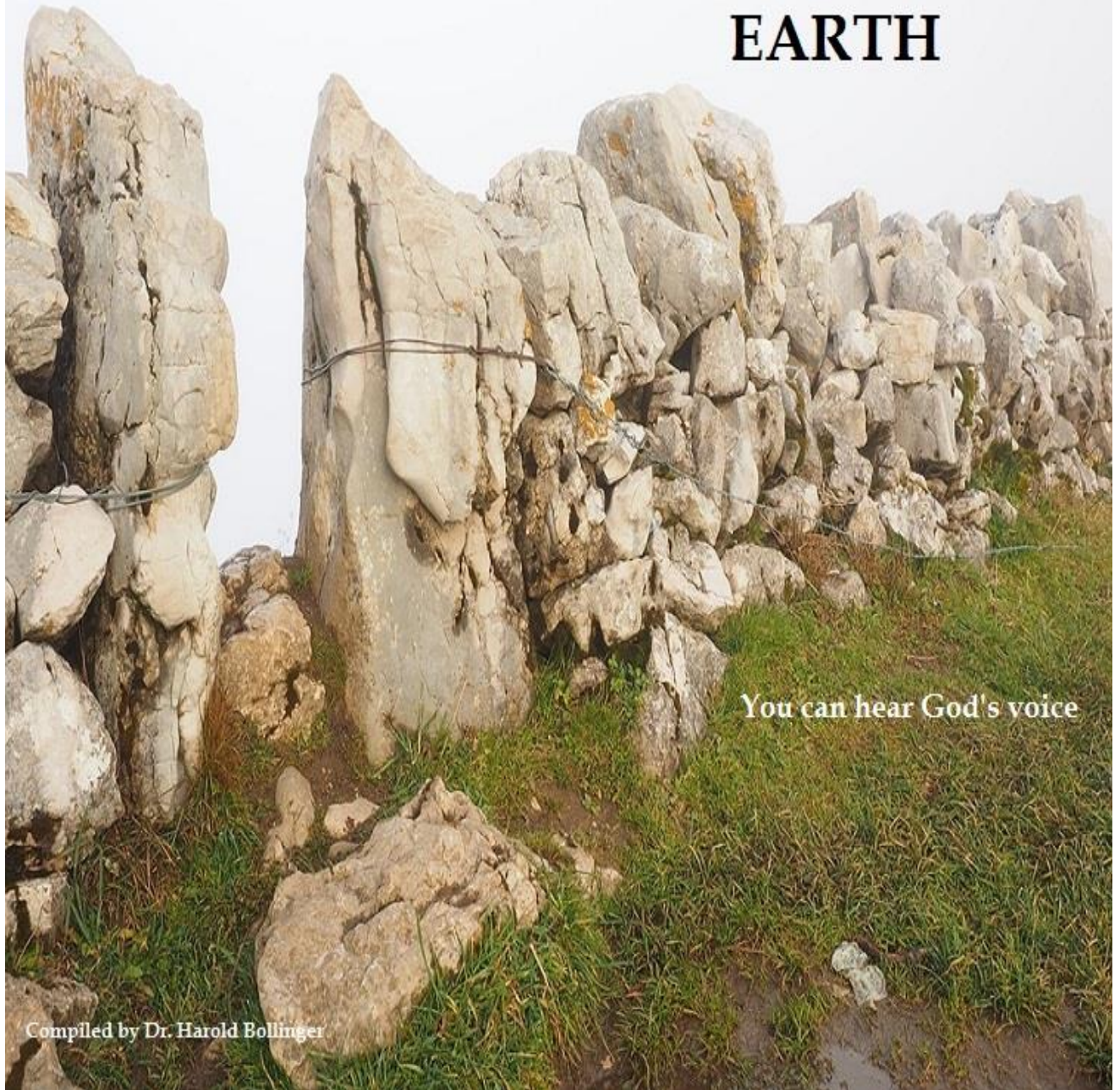

You can hear God's voice

No walls found between heaven and earth.

You can hear God's voice.

Because I sometimes say, "The Lord told me," others sometimes ask how I hear the voice of God.

I will give you some examples of how I hear God's voice. It is through the manifestation of the Holy Spirit.

When I once asked the Lord if I could ask him a certain question, immediately, the thing that came to my mind was: "You may ask me anything you wish to know."

Hearing the voice of God.

I asked the Lord, how to hear His voice. The Holy Spirit said: "To receive anything from God, you must yield to the Holy Spirit. Just as you yielded to the Holy Spirit for salvation, to speak in tongues, or to interpret tongues, or to prophesy, or to write a poem, or a song, or to answer a question from yourself or another."

It is all from yielding to the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is always present to a born again believer. Every believer can hear the voice of God.

A question concerning what those in heaven know about those on earth.

For example, on December 4, 2015, I asked the Lord this question, “Do those in heaven know what is happening on earth?”

The reply I received was, “Study what the Bible has to say about walls.”

I looked up every scripture in the Bible I could find about walls, but did not find any Scripture that said that there was a wall of separation.

I asked the Lord to reveal to me what walls the Bible was referring to concerning this question and the answer concerning walls. I heard, “They are the walls of jasper.”

I looked up the scripture concerning the walls of jasper and found that they were clear as crystal and could be seen through. (Rev. 4:3)

The reason I asked this question was because I have had a few experiences of hearing the voice of someone who had died.

When my wife and I were teaching school in a village in Alaska, a janitor who worked for the school fell from his boat in a rapid flowing river and drowned.

A few days later, I was asleep in the living quarters of the school when I felt someone awaken me. I sat up on the side of the bed, and there the janitor stood. He said, “I wanted to thank you for coming here to help my people.” I said, “You are welcome,” and then he was gone.

It could have been a dream, but it was as real as all of life, and stored in my mind like no dream.

Another time, I was working at a village school in Alaska and I had a heart attack. My family were in the Lower 48 states.

I was determined to get home. While in the airport in Seattle, Washington, I kept feeling that my spirit was leaving my body. I thought, "Well, I guess this is it. I just wish I could have made it home."

Right next to me, I heard my mother's voice. She said, "Hold on son, you can make it".

I determined at that moment to not die in the Seattle airport and I began to resist the feeling of dying.

One time, I was telling something that my dad had said to me that negatively compared me to my brother.

As soon as I told it, I heard him say. "No, no, no, that is not what I meant." I immediately said, "I am sorry, daddy. I will never tell that again."

In only one of these instances, I saw someone, who had been dead only a short time, in the other two instances, I heard only spoken words.

I will give scripture examples of hearing the voice of God concerning those who have died.

First Thessalonians 4:13: "I would not have you to be ignorant, brethren, concerning them which are asleep." In John 11, Jesus spoke of Lazarus as being asleep. But that has no reference to the soul and spirit.

Sleep has reference only to the body. This does not include the spirit and the soul. To be more specific, the body lies in the grave, but the spirit and soul return to God.

Luke 15:7-10 says there is more rejoicing in Heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine just persons who need no repentance.

Everything in heaven is spiritual. Those in heaven can likely discern spiritual things happening to friends and loved ones on earth.

They see friends and loved ones who accept Christ as Savior, and they rejoice over their salvation.

In Revelation 6:9-10 when the fifth seal was opened, "I saw under the altar the souls of them that were slain for the word of God, and for the testimony which they held: And they cried with a loud voice, saying, How long, O Lord, holy and true, dost thou not judge and avenge out blood on them that dwell on the earth?"

The souls are those who had been martyred or slain. They cried out with a loud voice. They were not asleep. Rather, they were talking to the Lord and asking Him how long before He did something about those who had martyred them.

The Lord answered them in verse 11, "And white robes were given unto every one of them; and it was said unto them, that they should rest yet for a little season, until their fellow servants, their brethren, should be killed as they were, and should be fulfilled."

We are compassed about by witnesses.

Hebrews 12:1: "Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses..." These witnesses are those mentioned in Hebrews 11, which lists at least seventeen names.

How much do those in heaven know?

I think it is unlikely that they see all the sin and sorrow.

Luke 15:10 says they (those in heaven) rejoice in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents.

The Transfiguration

A great example of those in heaven knowing about happenings on earth is the story of the transfiguration as is given in Luke 9:28-36.

About eight days later Jesus took Peter, James, and John to a mountain to pray. [29] And as he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothing became dazzling white. [30] Then two men, Moses and Elijah, appeared and began talking with Jesus. [31] They were glorious to see. And they were speaking of how he was about to fulfill God's plan by dying in Jerusalem.

[32] Peter and the others were very drowsy and had fallen asleep. Now they woke up and saw Jesus' glory and the two men standing with him. [33] As Moses and Elijah were starting to leave, Peter, not even knowing what he was saying, blurted out, "Master, this is wonderful! We will make three shrines—one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." [34] But even as he was saying this, a cloud came over them; and terror gripped them as it covered them.

[35] Then a voice from the cloud said, "This is my Son, my Chosen One. Listen to him." [36] When the voice died away, Jesus was there alone. They didn't tell anyone what they had seen until long after this happened.

Moses and Elijah represented the law and the prophets. Jesus represented grace.

Do the dead believers know what the living are doing? There is no clear biblical answer to this question. There are verses that can support the idea while there are other verses that seemingly contradict it. We have to leave this question open.

Jesus taught with parables.

Jesus taught with parables so the unbelievers could not understand, but those who believed understood. Perhaps we will never understand things that are not specifically spelled out in the Word of God.

At times the Lord may speak while ministering.

One time when I was conducting a funeral, the spirit of the Lord said to me: “Do not commit the body back to the earth, but unto God.” This changed the way I conducted a graveside prayer.

You can hear the voice of God.

I hope this example of hearing the voice of God will help you to hear His voice.

Any born again believer who can yield themselves to the Holy Spirit to be saved, or to be used to manifest any gift of the Holy Spirit, can hear the voice of God.

I wanted the Lord to say, “Yes,” or “no,” to my question, but I was led to a conclusion through the study of the Word of God. May God speak peace to you.
